These anti personnel mines represent a random selection of the most common mines that have been found in Southern Africa. Those mines marked * have been found inside RSA, the others were found in both the Rhodesian (Zimbabwe) and South West African (Namibia) conflicts and could appear in the future. These mines are included to assist untrained personnel to identify it as a mine should they be encountered. Most anti-personnel mines are buried below ground level and are detonated by persons standing on them, others are placed above ground level on stakes and are activated by persons tripping a wire. They are usually sited around sabotage scenes or on pathways and open areas frequently used by Security Personnel. (These mines are not necessarily supplied by country of manufacture.)

WARNING: These mines are dangerous. If found do not touch, report them to your nearest police station immediately, inform your superiors and implement laid down evacuation drills.
