GOOD news for the coloured squatter families at Klipfontein is that although their African counterparts are to be moved to Kenton location and Glenmore, they will be allowed to stay on the farm.

Council is engaged in a survey of the area, it is not known with any certainty how many coloured families live on Klipfontein.

Mr John Gunn, a 61-year-old pensioner who lives on the farm with his

family, estimates that there are at least 150 coloureds living there.

Many of them had lived there for a long time, he said. He came to Klipfontein in 1943 and worked in the area as a building con-

tractor until his retirement three years ago. Mr Gunn says he does not pay rent for his house.

wood and iron structure, and his son and son-in-law, both masons, have built a brick house nearby.

Mr Anderson said that the council would endea-

vour to improve the living conditions of coloureds on the farm even before the township got under way.
