- JUDSE'S REMARKS IN PASSING SENTENCE -

I have heard a great deal during the course of this case about the grievances of the non-European population. The accused have told me, and their counsel have told me, that the occused, who are all bedeen of the non-European population, have been motivated entirely by a desire to amplicate these grievances. I am by no means convinced that the motives of the accused were as altrimitic as they wished the Court to believe. People who organism a revolution usually plan to take over the Government, and personal ambition cannot be excluded as a motive.

The function of this Court, as is the function of a Court in any country, is to enforce law and order, and to enforce the laws of the State within which it functions.

The rime of which the accused have been convicted, that is the main crime, the crime of conspiracy, is in essence one of high treason. The State has decided not to charge the crime in this furm. Bearing this in mind, and giving the matter very sorious consideration, I have decided not to impose the up rame panalty which in a case

like this would usually be the proper penalty for the crime. But consistent with my duty, that is the only leniency which I can show.

The sentence in the case of all the accused will be one of life imprisonment. In the case of the accused who have been convicted on more than one count, these counts will be taken together for gumpose of sentence.
