omrade Sheila Weinberg was born on 1 October 1945 in Johannesburg. Her parents, Eli and Violet Weinberg, were active trade unionists and leaders of the SACP. From a very young age she committed herself to the struggle for freedom and social justice. Throughout her life she carried the flame of human dignity and equality.

In 1964, Sheila was the youngest detainee in South Africa, when at the age of 17 she was held at the Johannesburg Fort under the 90 day detention provisions. The next year she served a six month sentence for furthering the aims of the ANC. For many years she was banned and confined to her home under house arrest, but despite these restrictions, Sheila continued her activities both formally and informally. In the early 1980s, she helped to found the Human Rights Committee, which provided bursaries for the children of comrades.

With the launch of the United Democratic Front in 1983, Sheila became a key figure in the Johannesburg Democratic Action Committee (JODAC), where she was dedicated to building broad support for the liberation movement amongst the middle-class and whites. Sheila was a founding member of the Administrative Training Project (ATP), which empowered civics and trade unions, and Friends of UDF, which raised funds for the UDF while it was restricted.

Sheila became a pillar of the ANC in North East Johannesburg after its unbanning. In particular Sheila led the way in organizing domestic workers in the Gauteng Province. In 1994, Sheila was elected to the Gauteng Provincial Legislature where, for 10 years, she contributed to the governance and transformation of the province.

Many friends will also remember Sheila through her work with clay, creating pots, plates, mugs and vases which she shared as gifts over the years. After the 2004 election, she retired from the Gauteng Legislature with the intention to take up her pottery professionally.

Sheila will be remembered for her relaxed and easy commitment, her courage, her integrity and her lifelong commitment to the realization of a South Africa free of oppression and exploitation.

Cde Sheila is survived by her son, Mark.
